Dear Residents:

We would like to bring you up to date on a few of the projects that we have been working on.

CELL TOWER LEASE

We have agreed to a Lease Amendment with STC Five, LLC, the Tenant, which modifies the ground space under the Lease in exchange for a \$4,800 annual rent increase. Verizon Wireless wishes to co-locate on the existing tower. In exchange for our consent to the Verizon co-location and the co-location of one (1) additional commercial user, we will receive 20% of the Gross Revenue Payments received from Verizon Wireless and the additional commercial user. The current annual rent for the cell tower is \$14,778. With this lease amendment, we anticipate the annual rent to be approximately \$25,000.

STEVENS-CONNOR LEGION POST PROPERTY

The Legion Post has been notified that the Town Board will respond by May 1, 2009, to their offer to transfer ownership of the real property at 2611 Pinnacle Road to the Town of Rush in consideration of the Post's continued use of a portion of the space and other conditions. This should give us sufficient time to complete any necessary studies of the property, including, but not necessarily limited to, the completion of engineering, architectural and environmental concerns.

QUALITY COMMUNITIES GRANT

Have you noticed improvements to parks along the Honeoye Creek in the Towns of Rush and

Mendon and the Village of Honeoye Falls? If a plan prepared for this area by local governments and community groups is adopted, it will set priorities for additional improvements, enhance economic development, protect and manage sensitive environmental features, and coordinate public and private activities within this corridor. Two community meetings were held in the afternoon and evening of Monday, March 23rd to provide the public the opportunity to review and comment on the plan.

Originally funded by the Town of Rush with a Quality Communities Grant from the New York Department of State, the purpose is to prepare a consensus plan that governments and user groups can refer to, and eventually implement. The draft plan incorporates recommendations from a community workshop held in November 2007, New York State initiatives, related local planning studies, interviews, questionnaires, and special studies prepared by consultants. The plan addresses land use, recreation, economic development and tourism, historic and cultural resources, sustainable development, environmental protection, transportation and circulation, infrastructure, education and interpretation, and inter-governmental coordination. ANNUAL RE-ASSESSMENT OF PROPERTY

I have had calls from residents recently after they received their re-assessment notices, as they assumed that the Town Board has responsibility for the assessment of property. In order to clarify this misconception, I offer the following:

Assessments (responsibility of Assessor) .
Real Property Tax Law § 102(3), 514, 572:

1. Subdivision 3 of Section 102 of the Real Property Tax Law defines an assessor as %an elected or appointed officer or body of officers charged by law with the duty of assessing real property for the purposes of taxation or special ad valorem levies . . . %o

2. The Assessor must determine the market value of taxable properties and assess them at a uniform percentage of full value. It is also the assessor who selects the percentage of full value at which the property shall be assessed for tax purposes.

3. The employment of experts to appraise the value of real property is %or the assistance of the assessors in the assessment of real property+(Real Property tax Law, Section 572). But it is the assessor who evaluates the figures of the experts, makes his independent determinations, and verifies that he has estimated the value of the property in Section 514 of the Real Property Tax Law.

4. The assessor of a jurisdiction has the sole right to determine the level of assessment within his assessing unit. The Town Board may not substitute its judgment for that of the assessor.

ASSESSMENT ADMINISTRATION STUDY

The County of Monroe has accepted a grant of \$50,000 from the State to conduct a study to find ways to improve assessment administration. The goal is to improve the efficiency, transparency and equity to the taxpayers. We are participating in this study and have furnished all costs associated with the assessment administration process.

FORMER RUSH MARKET PROPERTY

I was hoping, at this time, to be able to provide some information about the property at the intersection of 251 and Route 15A, however, I will be able to do so in the very near future.

ENERGY CONSERVATION PROGRAM

We are participating in a program sponsored by the New York Power Authority (NYPA), which could result in the overall reduction in energy use and therefore a reduction in energy cost. NYPA will supervise all phases of an energy conservation project, beginning with an audit to identify opportunities to save energy and reduce costs and continuing through installation of such features as efficient lighting, motors, boilers, lighting occupancy sensors and computerized energy management systems. There are no out-of-pocket expenses on our part. All of our municipal buildings (Town Hall, Town Garage, Library) will be included in this study.

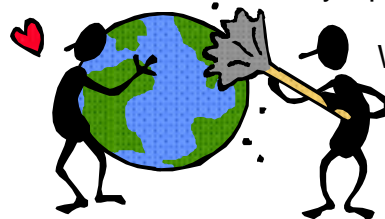
RUSH-HENRIETTA CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET REVIEW

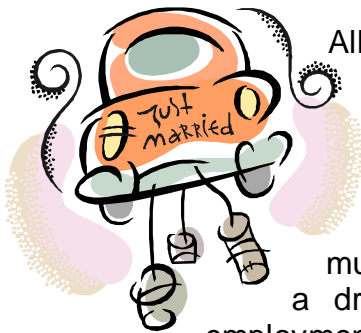

GETTING MARRIED IN NEW YORK STATE?



All couples must apply in person for a marriage license. Both the bride and groom must be present and proper current proof of identity must be presented, such as a driver's license, passport, employment picture ID. Also needed is proof of birth/age in the form of an original birth certificate or raised seal copy, baptismal certificate or elementary school transcript. If either party has been married before, final divorce decree(s) must be

presented. If your former spouse is deceased, a death certificate is also required.

A person's last name (**surname**) **does not automatically change upon marriage** and neither party of the marriage is required to change his or her last name. If you are changing your surname, it should be indicated on your license. If you wish to change your surname after marriage, you have the right to adopt a different name through usage at some future date.

After a marriage license is issued, it may be used after 24 hours and is valid for 60 days. The fee is \$40.00. The Town accepts cash or check only.

The Rush Town Clerk's office is an issuing agent for New York State.

TOWN CLERK'S OFFICE CLOSED

Assessments are in the news at this time. In 2007, the Town entered into an Agreement with the New York State Office of Real Property Services (ORPS+) to attempt to maintain assessments at an equalization rate of 100%. An Equalization Rate is the ratio at which a property is assessed compared to what it sells for as a bona fide+ sale. The Town and State review these sales each year

and, as long as that rate does not drop below 95%, we are allowed to claim a rate of 100%. When that rate drops below 95%, we need to revalue all of the properties in the Town and adjust assessments back to a suspected full market value.

During the month of March, our office met with many residents regarding the revaluation project. During April, determinations will be made with regard to those meetings and new notices will be mailed in early May.

Grievance Day is scheduled for June 2, 2009. Grievance forms are available online at http://www.orps.state.ny.us/ref/forms/pdf_fillin/rp524_fillin.pdf and also available in our office. For those who decide to go to Grievance, we are requesting those forms to be returned to our office by May 26, 2009, for copying purposes in preparation for Grievance Day.

With the onset of spring and the nicer weather it brings, we know we will see an increase in the number of inquiries about the need for a **building permit**. If the nice weather entices you to consider a building project, you should be aware of when a **building permit** is required. **Building permits** are required for most projects that a homeowner may consider. Some examples are: new roof, sheds, fences, pools, wood stoves, new windows/doors, garages, additions, porches, waste (septic) field repair/replacement, interior remodeling projects that change plumbing and/or electrical systems. Most every structure and/or alteration that you add to your property will require a **building permit**. If you are unsure, the best thing to do is call us to confirm the need for a

permit before you start your project. When you are ready to purchase a permit, you will need a site foot-print showing the location of the structure with setbacks and a set of construction prints, if applicable. Permit applications are available in the Town Clerk's Office.

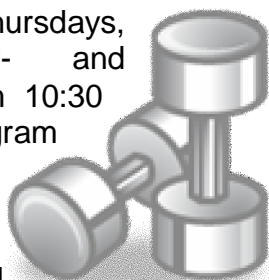

Town of Rush Residential Brush Pickup

The Town of Rush Highway Department will be conducting its annual brush pick-up for our town residents commencing April 20, 2009 and running to April 24, 2009.

The roadside brush collection will be a one-week program and all brush should be out and ready for collection by April 19th.

We will begin on East River Rd. and will be working eastward.

Guidelines:

- 2 Truckloads (10 wheeler) per household

- Residential pickup only
- All brush shall be no longer than 10 ft. in length
- All brush shall be placed 6 . 8 feet from edge of roadside
- Brush shall be placed parallel to the road.
- Brush must be neatly piled
- ***Do not place brush under any overhead wires, if possible.***
- ***Do not place brush over any water or gas service shut-offs.***



Restrictions:

- No Stumps, Lumber, Trash, Leaves, or Manmade articles.
- Brush and limb wood only
- Brush cut by residents only,
- **NO CONTRACTORS**

ONCE A ROAD OR STREET IS COMPLETED, THERE WILL BE NO RETURN TRIPS

Stonybrook Road Transfer Station

Hours of operation at the Stoneybrook Road Transfer Station will be on Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. . 5:00 p.m. and Sundays 12:00 p.m. . 4:00 p.m. Opening April 20th and closing on November 6th.

Town residences wishing to use a **private contractor** may pick up a %hauling/Usage Statement+ at the Town Hall. While obtaining residents' permission, this form will identify the person or company hauling the material to the site on your behalf. This form will be required at the site and is only good for that day.

If you have a special project planned and need to use the transfer station during the week, contact the Highway Department at 533-1770 at least one day in advance.

LAWN DAMAGE

Due to this past winter, the highway department will be repairing all lawns damaged by our plowing operations. Residents who have used stakes or markers during the winter months at the edge of their properties should have them removed by April 11th.

When these stakes are used next season, please put them at least 3-4 feet off the edge of pavement so the plow operators will have room to clear the streets.

This month I would like to briefly review some home fire safety items that I feel are important to keep your family safe.

As the nice weather arrives, many of you will begin working on the landscaping around your property. Each year, hundreds of mulch fires are reported in every state. They can burn structures and injure people. Most mulch fires are caused by human error and can be prevented. If you or someone in your family smokes, be sure that you do not discard your smoking materials in the mulch. Provide proper receptacles in which smoking materials can be discarded. Provide at least eighteen inches of clearance between landscaping beds and combustible building material. Consider the use of decorative stone instead. Keep proper clearance to electrical devices such as

outdoor lighting. Keep mulch beds moist as much as possible.

If you have a fire hydrant in front of your property, please make sure that it is kept unobstructed at all times. Do not plant trees, shrubs or flowers around it. Do not paint or alter the appearance of the hydrant. Do not put up fences or anything else that would impede the fire department's ability to utilize the fire hydrant. If you have any concerns about the condition of the fire hydrant in front of your property, contact the water authority.



The spring and summer are excellent times to make sure that you have house numbers that are visible from the roadway and that they are affixed to your house. In the event of an emergency, emergency services can locate your house quickly. Make sure your driveway and sidewalks around your home are clear of obstruction.

If you have central air conditioning or an emergency generator, be sure that they are in good working order in accordance with the manufacturers specifications, not only for efficiency, but for safety purposes as well.

If you use a propane gas grill for cooking, please take some time to make sure that it is clean and in good condition prior to use. If it

has been stored for the winter, clean the fuel jets and burners. Often times insects will nest inside, obstructing the flow of the propane to the burner. When cooking outdoors, keep the grill at least ten feet away from your home, patio, deck or other structures.

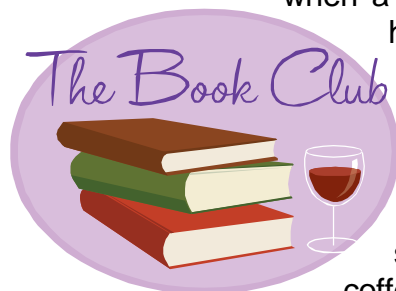

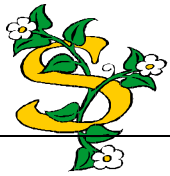

FIRE DISTRICT

FEDERAL GRANT: The fire district will receive a \$20,500 Federal Grant for safety ropes and a thermal imaging camera. Past Chief Dale Sweet applied for the grant last year.

HOUSE NUMBERS AND IDENTIFICATION:

Our crews are still having problems finding the correct locations because of either no house number or it being hard to see from the road. We recently had a serious EMS call at 6:00 am where the jogger was struck had no ID. She was in no condition to tell us or the sheriff anything. It took until late afternoon to notify her family. Please have some ID on your person. You should wear a reflective vest when you take a stroll, walk your dog or jog near the roadway.

"In Case of Emergency" (ICE) campaign:

We all carry our mobile phone with names and numbers stored in its memory, but no one, other than ourselves, knows which of these

numbers belong to our closest family or friends. If we were to be involved in an accident or were taken ill, the people attending us would have our mobile phone but wouldn't know who to call. Yes, there are hundreds of numbers stored, but which one is the contact person in case of an emergency? The concept of ICE is catching on quickly. It is a method of contact during emergency situations. As cell phones are carried by the majority of the population, all you need to do is store the number of a contact person or persons who should be contacted during emergency under the name "ICE."

This is a nationally recognized name for this purpose. In an emergency situation, emergency service personnel and hospital staff would be able to quickly contact the right person by simply dialing the number you have stored as ICE. For more than one contact name, simply enter ICE1, ICE2, ICE3, etc.

RADIO UPGRADES: The main fire station had two new antennas and wires installed to correct a problem with feed back. The main antenna was put up in 1971 and was completely shot from the 38 years of weather. This upgrade cost was \$3,000.

FIRE SIREN: The 68 year old fire siren at station one is shut down for the time being. This siren was on a tower by the town hall from 1941 to 1971 when it was relocated to the new fire station. A weld was broke on the mounting bracket and some wires were exposed due to years of wind and rain. We are looking into our options as to weather to get it fixed or leave it shut off. The sirens at both stations are on timers and do not sound after 9 pm and come back on at 7 am. If you have any input in this matter call Bob Faugh at 533-1892.

RUSH FD RESCUE USED IN EDUCATIONAL BOOK IN CALIFORNIA

Moneoye Creek Rescue is one of the many stories found in the Anthology series of books for the California Gateways program. This

program is aimed at Middle School students who are struggling to read at an Elementary School level. The program is designed to boost their reading skills so that they are reading the same books as their on-level peers within two years.

The unit in which Moneoye Creek Rescue appears is centered around the theme: What makes a person admirable? Throughout the unit's reading, students get to explore different ways of answering this question. This story makes an excellent addition to the student's discussion. Something that makes a person admirable is bravery in the face of danger, self-sacrifice, and the other heroic traits embodied in the volunteer firemen who rescued Scott from grave danger.

In August of 2008, by a vote of 8-0, California Gateways was unanimously approved for adoption by the California State Board of Education. The program could ultimately place the Anthology series in the hands of 1 to 2 million California Middle School students, all of whom will get to enjoy the story of Rush New York Volunteer Fire Department.

Each Rush Firefighter in the boat that night received a copy at the Past Officers Banquet held March 7th. A copy of the book will be given to the Rush Library. Its name is **California Gateways**.



FUND DRIVE: In 2008 your volunteers responded to 378 emergency calls, that's one every 23 hours. They donated over 7,000 hours to provide emergency service, attend meetings, attended training and drills, raise funds and maintain buildings and equipment with only ONE goal and that is to provide the best service we can for you and your family. We are 100% volunteer, **NO ONE GETS PAID!** We have one of the last free ambulance services in the county and cover 99.5% of our calls! You should receive the annual fund drive letter and postage paid envelope for the AMBULANCE and FIRE DEPARTMENT operation in April.

LADIES AUXILIARY:

We use fund drive money for our scouting, fire prevention programs, training and seminars. No fund drive money is used for our few social events. Very few Fire Departments or Ambulance services can say that! We are very proud and thankful to the Rush residents who support us with donations.

NEW RESCUE TRUCK: This year's fund drive will assist in the purchasing of a new heavy rescue vehicle. We have saved every year for the past 18 years for a new truck. We have \$390,000 in the replacement fund. Our present truck is 18 years old and will be sold because it is still worth something. The fund drive and other department fund raising activities have bought the 1957, 1974 and 1991 Rescue trucks. **WE THANK YOU IN ADVANCE FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION!**

PAST OFFICERS BANQUET: The Rush Fire Department's Banquet was held at the RIT Inn . over 100 members and guests attended.



Past Chief Dale Sweet was given a plaque and gift for his nine years as Chief. In his time as Chief, he assisted and/or applied for and received \$116,000 of State and Federal grants for equipment. Dan Monaghan was awarded the Distinguished Service Award for his 20 years of dedicated service. Other past officers given recognition were Vern Wanderslaben, Jacob Vogt, Kevin Kinnally, Steve Winner and Heidi Sweet. Bev Smith received her 20 Year pin. The Rush Fire Department Ladies Auxiliary presented a check for \$2,000 to the firefighters.

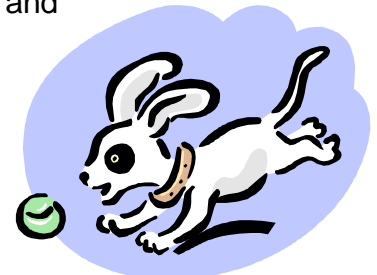

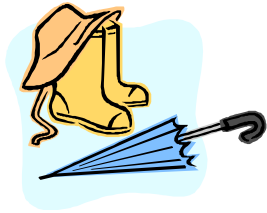
